SOS CHILDREN'S VILLAGES AND THE TSUNAMI

For those of you who would like to support the tsunami relief effort of a very unique organization that originated in Austria, an envelope is enclosed. SOS Children's Villages has established 16 family refugee camps for tsunami victims in Southeast Asia and is asking for funds to maintain these camps for as long as necessary.

Traude and some of us had been in contact with representatives of SOS Children's Villages USA even before the tsunami, and we were wondering how we as a group could help this worth while organization. Our member Brigitte Paine has been very involved with SOS Children's Villages for many years. Here is what she writes:

"In November, Traude Acker hosted a meeting for representatives from SOS Children's Villages USA, who came from Washington D.C. Didi Harrington and Brigitte Paine attended the meeting, discussing ways that we as an organization might be able to support their efforts in the USA.

Most Austrians are familiar with SOS Kinderdoerfer which were founded by Hermann Gmeiner in 1948 in Austria. For those members who are not familiar with SOS Kinderdoerfer, a brief description:

Gmeiner, a medical student, returned home from WWII and saw a desperate need to help the many war orphans. He did not like the concept of large orphanages, but based his idea on a concept of a Mother, Brothers and Sisters, a House, and a Village. This concept has proven to be a great success. Today, SOS Kinderdorf International operates 442 children's villages in 135 countries of the world, including 2 villages in the US, one in Florida and one in Chicago. It is an independent, private, not for profit organization. In addition it has developed vocational centers, social centers, medical centers, schools, and emergency relieve programs.

We have just been notified by SOS Children's Villages USA, that SOS Kinderdorf International has created 16 family refugee camps in Southeast Asia in response to the tsunami disaster. They would appreciate any financial support we can give.

If any of our members would like to contribute to this cause, we would suggest to support SOS Children's Villages in their effort to help these families. We have been informed that none of the SOS Children's Villages in this region have suffered any loss or damage."
